



# A(KNOWLEDGEMENT OF (OUNTRY

This Acknowledgement of Country resource has been compiled by the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Parent Committee of the Council of Catholic School Parents NSW/ACT for use by Catholic school communities.

Note: an Acknowledgement of Country is not the same as a Welcome to Country. This resource describes each and distinguishes between the two.

### WHAT IS A WELCOME TO COUNTRY?

A Welcome to Country is when a traditional custodian of the land, typically a respected Elder or delegate of the local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community, welcomes visitors to his or her Country. The welcome ceremony can take many different forms and may include prayer, smoking and water blessings, dance and art according to local customs/traditions. Elders should always be meaningfully involved in the planning of any Welcome to Country. It is both a right and a privilege of the Elder to provide a Welcome. As far as is possible, a Welcome to Country should commence proceedings for all significant community events.

# WHAT IS AN A(KNOWLEDGEMENT OF COUNTRY?

An Acknowledgement of Country is a way of showing an awareness of, and respect for, the traditional Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander custodians of Australia's land, seas and waterways. It also acknowledges the deep physical, spiritual and family connections that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples have to their Country.

#### WELCOME TO COUNTRY

Only a traditional custodian or delegate can conduct a Welcome to Country ceremony.



#### ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF COUNTRY

Anyone in the community can provide an Acknowledgement of Country.

## HOW (AN OUR (OMMUNITY IN(ORPORATE AN A(KNOWLEDGEMENT OF (OUNTRY?

An Acknowledgement is given at all school and community gatherings and meetings. It can be used at assemblies, parent association meetings, school board meetings and special events, whether in person or online. It is typically given once at the commencement of the gathering in accordance with local diocesan protocols and customs. Students as well as adults, Aboriginal or non-Aboriginal, can give the Acknowledgement of Country.



#### A(KNOWLEDGEMENT OF COUNTRY EXAMPLE:

We pay our respects to Elders past and present and we recognise the young people who are our future.


We acknowledge all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families in our communities.

We respect their deep physical and spiritual connections to Country through their stories, traditions and living cultures.

The Acknowledgement should identify the relevant Aboriginal nation (or nations). The name of the Aboriginal nation and/or language group that your school community falls within can be found on can be found on the map below.
